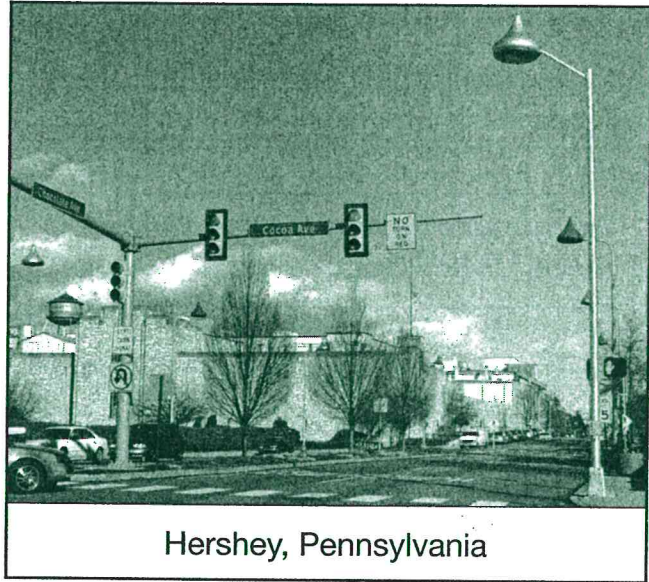

Making Life Sweeter for Others

Hershey, Pennsylvania, is the home of the Hershey Chocolate Factory. Approaching this city, the aroma of chocolate fills the air. A sign with the words "The Sweetest Place on Earth" greets visitors as they enter the city. Streets named Chocolate Avenue and Cocoa Avenue are seen. Lampposts that look like chocolate kisses line the streets. In front of a large house is a sign that reads "Home of the Chocolate King." This home once belonged to Milton Hershey, a man who produced the most famous chocolate in the world.

Early Life

Hershey was born in 1857. He grew up on a farm in Pennsylvania. At a young age, his parents taught him the value of hard work. Hershey's family moved many times while he was a boy, so he was often unable to attend school. Milton Hershey only completed the fourth grade.

Early Businesses

Mr. Hershey worked in a print shop when he was fourteen years old. He disliked using paper and ink. Two years later, he began working in a candy kitchen. Hershey enjoyed this job and soon became a skilled candymaker. He opened his own candy business at the age of nineteen.

The first candy company opened by Hershey was unsuccessful. During the next few years, he owned two more candy companies which failed. Hershey was not discouraged by his failures. He later opened a caramel-making company in 1883. This business was successful.

Making Chocolate

While visiting a fair in 1893, Milton saw a chocolate candy-making machine. Chocolate was expensive, so few people were able to buy it. Milton Hershey had a dream. He purchased the machine because he believed he could make chocolate that people could afford.

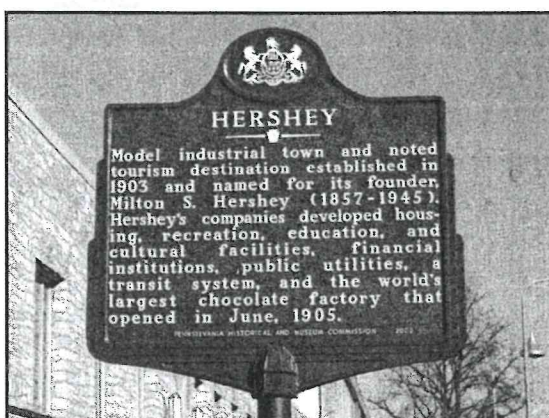
Hershey first began making chocolate in his caramel factory. He experimented with different recipes until he discovered the right mixture of cocoa, milk, and sugar. Everyone loved his chocolate. People bought the candy bars faster than he could produce them. By 1900 Hershey sold his caramel business to allow him more time to make chocolate.

Helping Others

Milton Hershey needed a location for his chocolate factory. He bought land near the town where he was born. Mr. Hershey not only constructed a factory, but he also built houses, schools, and stores. He wanted the people who worked for him to live in a nice community. Hershey knew it was important to take care of his workers.

Hershey did many things to improve his community. He built a park for the children. He also built a home and school for orphans. Hershey and his wife wanted these children to have a place to live and a school to attend. This caring man built a college in his hometown to allow local students to continue their educations.

Milton Hershey died in 1945. He gave his money to the town of Hershey, so his factory and schools could continue after his death. Today, many people work in Hershey's chocolate factory. Children attend the schools he built. This good man knew the value of work and of giving. Milton Hershey will always be remembered for making life sweeter for others.

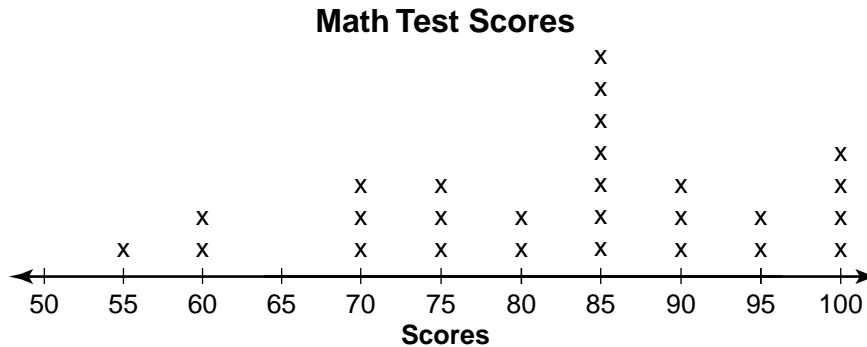

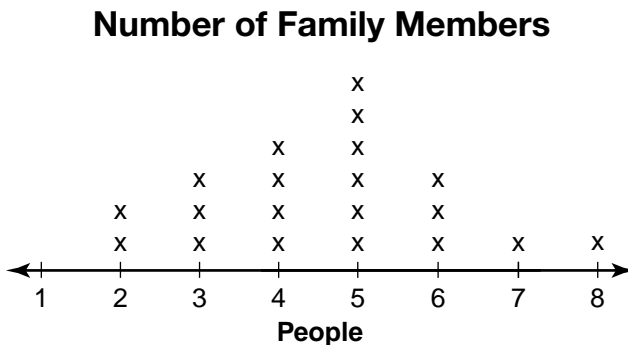

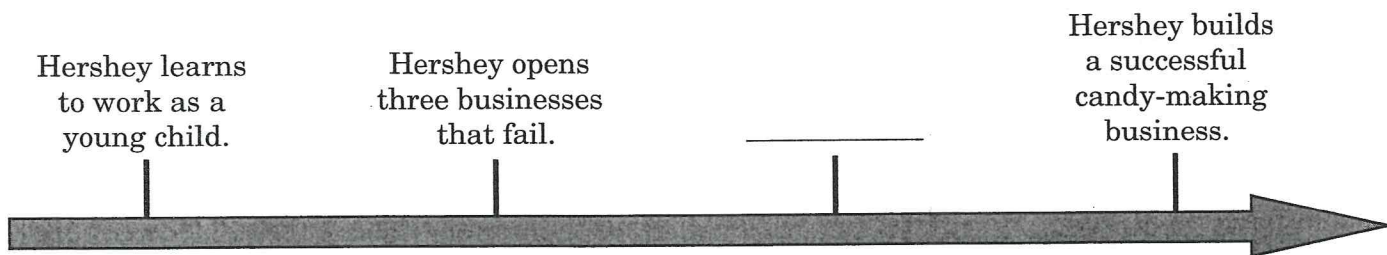

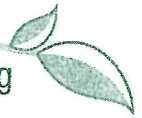

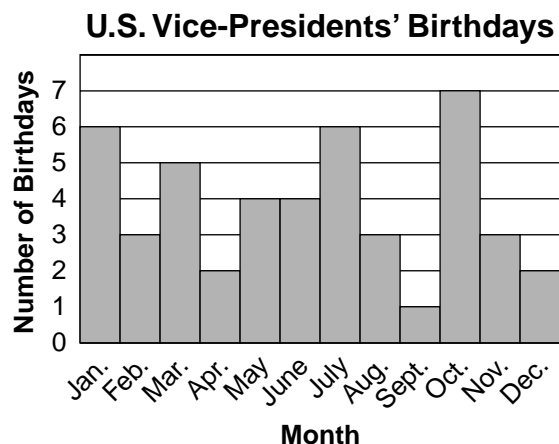

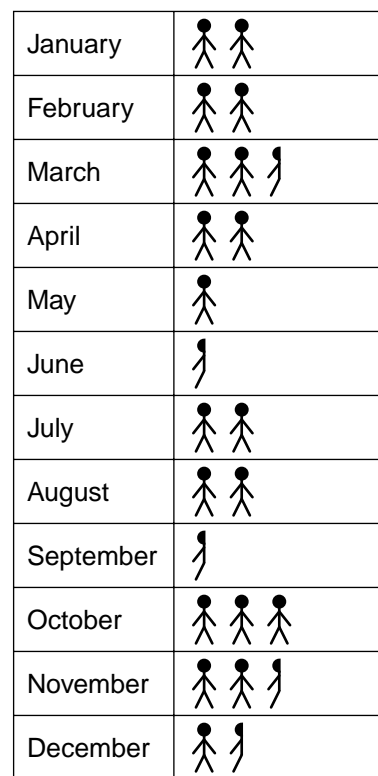

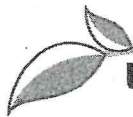

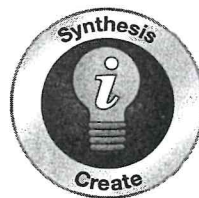

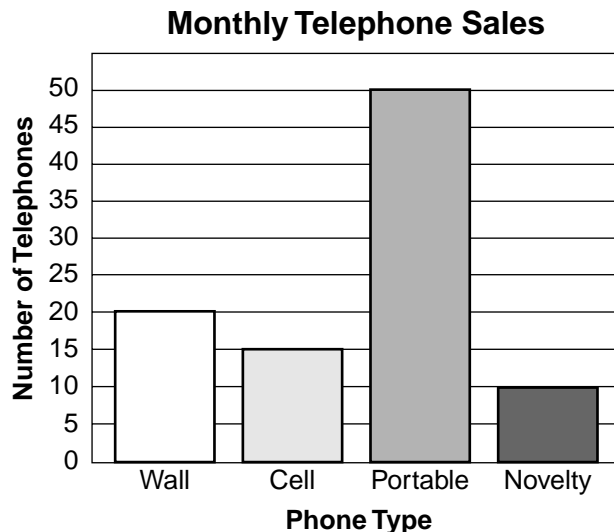

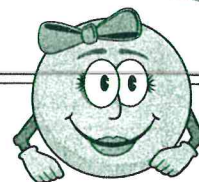
Today, there are many different types of phones for sale. The bar graph shows the number of different types of phones sold in one month at Abe's Communication Store.

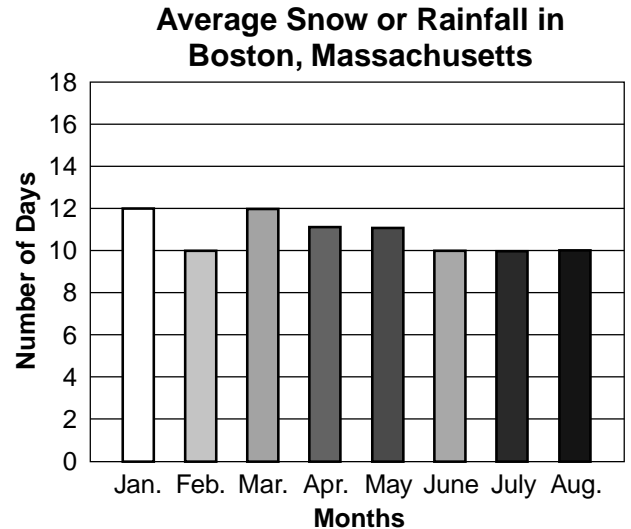
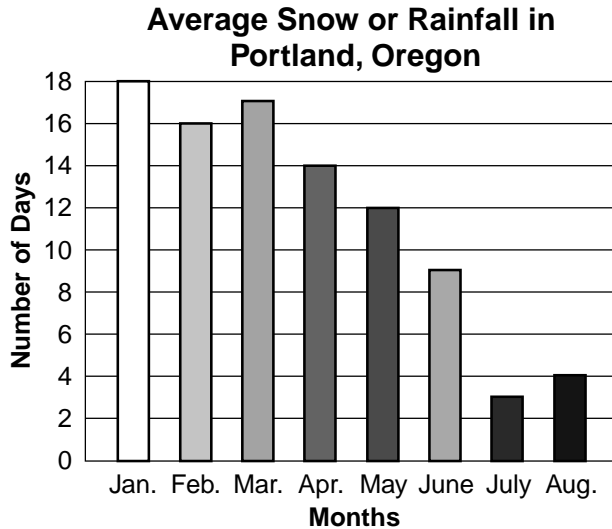
